
## Nf Timeline Phrases (for child's follow-on work—paper timeline)



Rolled yellow fadeless paper cut to about 10 ft 6 in. (or the size of the burlap timeline) Provide stiff cardboard templates of the width of the lines—above and below the martyr lines, Agnus Deis, years, emperors, etc. Assist with year spacing. The child draws images, cuts and glues them in place, cuts and glues, or copies, or writes his or her own phrases. Phrases below are included in the event they would be helpful. The child's own composition for each object/picture drawn is always a better way to go.

began in 753 B. C, continued expanding until A. D. 100's, fell in A. D. 476

self-centered, brutal Emperor but Christianity flourished anyway

considered 'god' with ultimate earthly power

the death of Christians entertained the crowds

used for military actions, trade, political maneuvers, and spreading the Gospel

shows allegiance to Rome, its gods and emperors

used deadly violence to overpower and conquer

sign of the conquering Roman Empire carried by the military

massive, lavishly decorated and built by slaves, soldiers and the poor

used by the Roman military and in races for violent entertainment

color and style shows the different classes of Roman society

held the portrait of the Emperor who had ultimate earthly power

the wealthy had an over-abundance of rich, tasty foods

human but property for serving the wealthy; manual laborers

thought to have power to control life, must be pleased

Phrases for Box 2 Life of Jesus

Faith reveals the poor, tiny baby to be the salvation of God's beloved people.

"You are my Son, my Beloved" who is given as a Model to all people.

nonviolent entry into Jerusalem; rejection of war and conquest

"Love your friends and your enemies" is His message

Jesus is God's healing presence in the world.

gave Himself as a source of Nonviolent Love for His followers in the sharing of the bread and wine

forgave the enemies who killed Him

Peter didn't understand Jesus' Nonviolent Love yet

Jesus died as the sacrificial Lamb which brings our healing.

Christ is Risen! Jesus' Way of Nonviolent Love is the Truth

disciples receive understanding and God's power

the emperor throughout Jesus' adult life

Phrases for Box 3 Life of the Early Christians

early Christians responded to Jesus' life and message by living communally

Peter and the other apostles move out from Jerusalem as Jesus' voice of Nonviolent Love for the world.

disciples performed the works of mercy

sharing the Eucharistic meal remained a source of strength for the communities

first martyr—a witness to Nonviolent Love

Paul was martyred under Emperor Nero

became completely different when he put on the mind of Christ

first leader of the early Church—the voice of Jesus in the world

writings and missionary travels took him throughout the Roman Empire

wanted to be crucified upside-down.

blamed for Nero's fire these Christians were Rome's first martyrs

Father, forgive them; they don't understand empathy, love or being human.

## cemeteries of the Christians

oral tradition, or telling and hearing the story of Jesus, becomes written tradition in St. Mark's Gospel

Paul's missionary work fills half of this writing

written accounts of Jesus' life were shared between communities

Phrases for Box 4 Early Christianity Continues and Emperor Plaques

preaching Jesus' message of Love continued

the teaching of the twelve apostles; way of life and the way of death

certificate proving "religious duty" was performed

secret sign points the direction to gathering place

Christ wanted no one to take up the sword—ever.

periodic persecution of Christians continues

## cemeteries of the Christians; places of prayer for the dead

Phrases for Box 5 Martyrs

martyrs chose to witness to Jesus' Nonviolent, Lamb-like Love.

Phrases for Box 6 Agnus Dei Summation

supreme symbol of the early Christians—innocent, gentle and suffers for the sake of others
